


### **Letter from the President**



## By the numbers:

#### AEF was founded in 2003

Annual appeal contributions for fiscal year 2020-2021: \$27,519.

This represents a 110% increase over last year's appeal. The number of donors increased to 130, a 46% increase yearover-year and the average amount donated was \$175, an increase of 15% year-over-year.

The funds raised through the annual appeal has steadily increased from the first year's results of \$7,015 to our 2020-2021 results. This is an increase of 300%.

AEF funded 7 grants in 2020-2021, including a special grant submitted by the district.

The board of Directors consists of 15 member volunteers. Through its volunteer force, and community partners, AEF implements its mission through teacher grants, administration of the La Due and DeSoccio scholarships, Hall of Distinction to honor graduates of Auburn High School, as well as many other activities that enrich the educational opportunities of students in the AECSD.

## What we accomplished in 2020-2021

Held a successful annual appeal, that included donations from corporate sponsors who in the past have supported events that could not be held this year due to the Covid pandemic, including Hall of Distinction. Increased annual appeal over 2019-2020 by 110%.

# Auburn Education Foundation 2020-2021 Grant Projects

Through a competitive grants process, Auburn Education Foundation (AEF) awards funding to educators who have creative project ideas that capture the attention and imagination of Auburn Enlarged City School District students, but which cannot be supported through the regular district budget. To date, AEF has funded more than 140 creative educational projects in grades K-12. During the 2020/21 school year, AEF supported several projects—examples of which are highlighted below—that enabled students to learn in unique and innovative ways.

### **AJHS Cloud Based Video Editing**

#### Auburn Junior High School

A subscription to WeVideo was purchased for use by eighth graders at Auburn Junior High School. Video production is considered to be a "must have" skill and has been incorporated into the AJHS Technology Curriculum for several years. Students will learn about all aspects of making movies and will take on the role of script writer, videographer, director, talent and sound editor of their own video projects. This program will provide cloud based operation for remote, hybrid and in-school productions allowing all in the target group to participate. Potential projects include creating their own video yearbook.

## **Fatal Vision Opioid Program**

#### Auburn Junior and High School

A Fatal Vision's Opioid Program Kit educates junior high and high school students on the effects and dangers of the use of opioids. The kit is an interactive learning experience that models how opioid use depresses the central nervous system, causing several impairments. These impairments negatively impact an individual's health, quality of life and safety. By experiencing the behavioral effects of opioid use, participants are more aware of people's susceptibility and knowledgeable of the severe consequences associated with using opioids.

## Understanding the Weather -Using Models

#### Auburn Junior and High School

The Auburn Dearth Science Department purchased the American Meteorological Weather Cycler, interactive models that allow students to manipulate a variety of weather variables and see the cause and effect of this variable manipulation. The goal is to help students understand the complex weather phenomenon in the atmosphere. Students will analyze and interpret the data on the model. Students will read the graphs on the weather cycler and identify fronts and associated weather patterns. These models will be used by Earth Science teachers in both the High School and Junior High School.

## **Yoga and Mindfulness Reboot**

#### Auburn Junior High School

The Yoga program at Auburn Junior High School continues with funding for yoga mats, blocks and other associated items to keep this successful program available to students. Yoga is a lifetime benefit that helps to decrease stress in students' lives and increase mindfulness. Yoga classes are offered to Health 8 classes throughout the school year and also to those students in need of extra support with Covid related stress/issues.







\$32,810.75 in teacher grants were awarded for the 2020-2021 school year!

## \$25,000 Grant to the Auburn Enlarged City School District Personalized Learning Teacher Fellowship

#### All Schools

This grant supplements a personalized learning teacher fellowship program used by the district at all grade levels. Supplies were purchased to further enhance the students' experiences in this individualized learning model. This fellowship helps educators reimagine what is possible for every student by redesigning the classroom experience. Selected educators engage in workshops to collaborate, to learn and practice strategies which will be implemented within the classroom for both in-person and remote instruction. Students have a voice and a choice in their learning through projectbased activities and choice boards. Students self-assess their progress and engage in conferencing with the teacher to set and monitor individual learning goals. Students will also be targeted to serve as tech-mentors for their peers. Staff will be encouraged to visit these classrooms to observe and learn about this innovative practice.

## GooseChase

GooseChase is a digital scavenger hunt where you compete against other people to complete "missions" involving either text, photo, or video answers. Each mission is assigned a point value, and you may be given bonus points for creativity. There will be prizes for the most creative submissions. This program will serve as an engaging activity to help students and families create a sense of community that has been lost due to Covid.

## Snowshoes for Herman Ave Kindergarten Students

#### Herman Elementary

Twenty-five pairs of snowshoes were purchased for Herman Ave Elementary School to be used in gym classes. These snowshoes provide opportunities for outdoor exercise and additional learning opportunities for students. Outdoor activities are needed during these times when children are spending much time inside and will serve as a chance for children to recharge and refocus. These snowshoes can be used in other grade levels as the snowshoes fit a range of boot sizes.





## Personalized Learning Teacher Fellowship

The funding received from the AEF grant allowed the Auburn Enlarged City School District to provide technology to be able to implement student technology mentors, software for teachers to be able to implement collaborative, project-based learning and student reflection as well as supplies and materials for families to support children at home with their learning. These resources were used to enhance the work we were doing with our personalized learning teacher fellowship. The Personalized Learning Fellowship was designed to support Auburn ECSD teacher leaders with deepening their understanding of the Core Four of Personalized Learning and implementing these elements in their classrooms. The CORE Four are:

#### **1. Targeted Instruction**

Instruction aligns to specific student needs and learning goals.

#### 2. Flexible Content and Tools

Instructional materials allow for differentiated path, pace, and performance tasks.

#### 3. Student Reflection and Ownership

Ongoing student reflection promotes ownership of learning.

#### 4. Data Driven Decisions

Frequent data collection informs instructional decisions and groupings.

The \$25,000 AEF grant allowed us to purchase laptops for 15 student tech mentors. These students supported their peers as a part of the ownership of learning. They did this during lunches, study halls and student collaborative times. The, 'tech mentors', supported remote students with technology troubleshooting, password reset, zoom sessions for navigating platforms and software needs. This support led to the tech mentors being able to develop leadership skills under the guidance of their teacher as well as over 200 students who reported they were able to get support from a peer that led to them being successful with classwork. The funding also allowed us to purchase a district-wide (7 buildings) subscription for Gimkit. Gimkit is a software program that teachers use for student assessment and then use the data from that to plan for individual student needs. Gimkit Live is the most popular component of the program which is essentially a learning game where teachers can create quizzes in the form of a game show. This was very successful and engaging for students as well as an efficient way for teachers to collect student achievement data. The last thing the funding was used for was family engagement materials. Schools held family engagement nights where they taught families how to use different math, ELA and technology resources and then gave all families that participated the resources to bring home. These resources included, books, math and literacy games, manipulatives for hands on math learning, headphones for digital resources, spelling games and dice just to name a few.

We received positive feedback on all 3 areas that we targeted with funding. Students reported that having peers available to support them had a positive impact on their remote and hybrid learning success. Students also reported high engagement and interest in the use of Gimkit and Gimkit live. Teachers reported that Gimkit helped make remote and hybrid assessment more efficient and engaging for students. Families reported that the materials and resources provided through family engagement nights were very helpful in working with their children at home. Many families requested these events to continue next year.

The funding we received from the AEF allowed us to further expand the work we were doing with our teachers through the personalized learning fellowship. This funding greatly enhanced the teachers' experience and the impact on students.



## GooseChase

This past year AEF awarded a grant to Auburn Librarians Victoria Calarco and Anne Mlod to fund a subscription to GooseChase, an online scavenger hunt app. Anne and Victoria learned about the app GooseChase while attending a conference. Game creators push missions out to players. Missions are text, video, or picture based and each mission is assigned a point value. As players complete missions their entries appear on the game stream and they are awarded points. This community building project, in which over two hundred people throughout the district participated, helped students, families, and staff cope with the isolation that Covid brought with it. 
